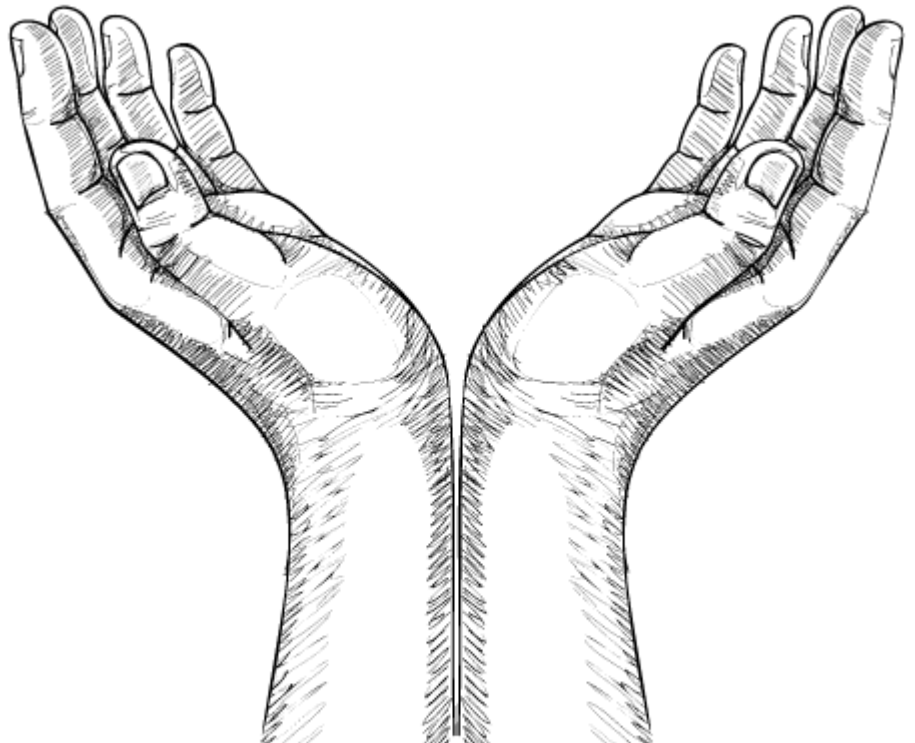

REFLECTION WITH FATHER REMY

THE MORAL LIFE

Before getting into the nitty-gritty of the subject, we must explain the components of the moral act in numbers 1749 to 1776 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. It is essential to highlight that this document was published in 1992 to replace the old Roman Catechism in force since 1566 (AVERY CARDINAL DULLES, 1995). The Roman Catechism, also known as the Catechism of the Council of Trent, was written in Latin and was an effort to consolidate and convey the teachings of the Church. It covers the sacraments, prayer, commandments, morality, and other fundamental aspects of the Catholic faith.

The new Catechism of the Catholic Church presents a moral vision based on the teachings of the Catholic faith. Fundamental ethical principles and doctrines guide this moral perspective. This document offers a more detailed and comprehensive explanation of the basic moral principles of the Catholic faith. These principles are designed to guide Catholics in their decisions and actions by providing a solid ethical framework based on the Church's tradition and magisterial teaching. Three essential components of the moral act are listed in this section.

The three components were found in this order:

- 1) the conscious choice between good and evil
- 2) The morality of an action depends on the intention, circumstances, and object of the action
- 3) the morality of passions

The Conscious Choice Between Good and Evil

In his presentation on Moral Theology, Mattison said that human reason is neither nullified nor degraded by assenting to the contents of faith, which are, in any case, achieved through free and informed choice (Mattison, 2008). The ability to discern between good and evil is often called moral conscience. Moral conscience is an internal faculty that guides ethical decisions. This can be acquired in several ways. But within the scope of living the Catholic faith, this practice is carried out in the light of Holy Scripture and the testimony of theological virtues.

Many ethical traditions have fundamental ethical principles and virtues that guide the choice between good and evil. For example, regulations such as justice, respect for human dignity, and virtues such as honesty and compassion can influence moral decisions. Finally, the choice between good and evil often involves careful reflection on the ethical implications of an action. Personal values, ethical principles, contextual considerations, and the pursuit of the common good can influence ethical decision-making.

The Morality of an Action Depends on the Intention, Circumstances, and Object of the Action

We saw the Catechism state that “through free will, each person shapes their own life”. So far, there has yet to be any discussion about exactly how this works. Why do our intentional actions shape us? What does this matter for moral theology? (Mattison, 2008). Intent refers to the purpose or motive behind an effort. According to this ethical principle, an action can be morally evaluated based on its intention. If the choice is excellent and oriented towards good, this can positively influence the morality of the action.

The end does not justify the means. Therefore, the condemnation of an innocent person cannot be justified as a legitimate means of saving the people (#1757). Some actions are considered morally good or bad based on their essential nature. The ethical principle argues that even a good intention cannot justify an intrinsically evil act. This moral principle is often summarized in the “triple source” or “three conditions” formula and is found in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, which states that “the morality of an action depends on three conditions: the chosen object, the end or intention, and of the circumstances of the action” (CIC 1750).

Morality of Passions

As the name “passion” indicates, we are passive in our emotional responses, simply responding to the stimuli or situations we find ourselves in. When we are delighted, our hearts skip a beat. When we are angry, our blood boils. When we are afraid, our hearts race, and our senses become heightened. Just like our desires for sex, food, and drink, our emotions are bodily cravings or aversions to the things we encounter. The classic way to describe the difference between moral and non-moral human activities is to say that only those activities that involve our reason and will (the capacities that generate our freedom) are appropriately called honest and, therefore, praised or blamed. Around us (with) our senses) and making choices based on that understanding (with our will), we exercise our freedom and are responsible for our activities. Deliberate decisions are expressions of our free will, while reflexes are not.


Finally, the Catholic moral tradition often addresses the passions as an integral part of the human experience, highlighting the importance of ordering the passions appropriately to achieve virtue and avoid sin. To conclude, the question would be: how did the catechism of the Catholic Church distance itself from the idea of prohibitions and rules imposed by society?

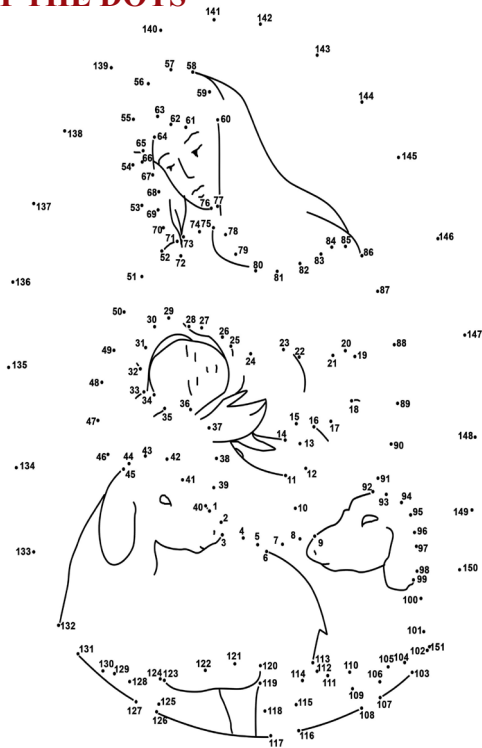

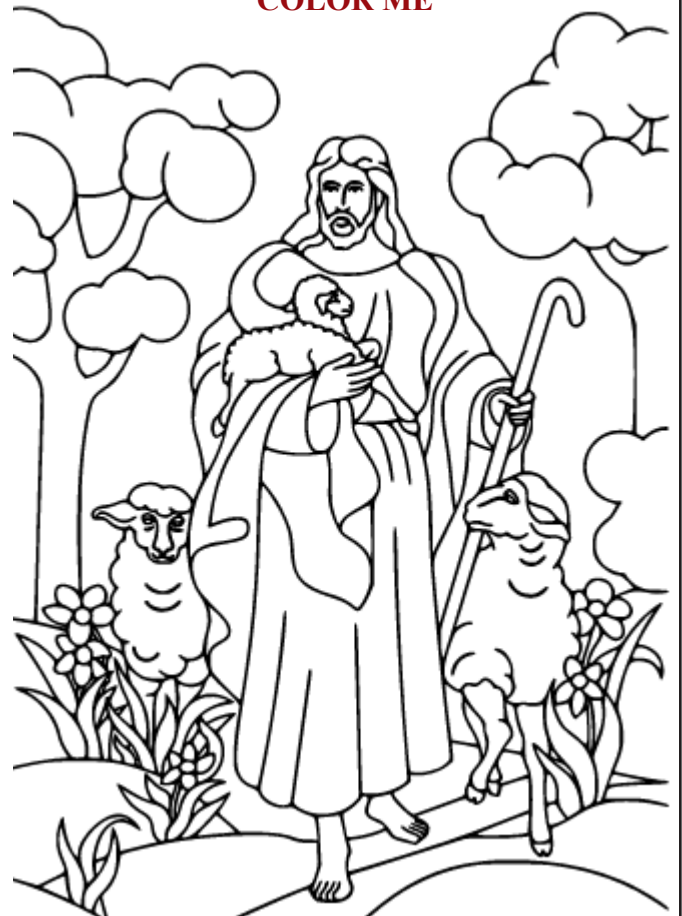

Lent Is Around the Corner

On February 14, we celebrate Ash Wednesday, the day we transition from Ordinary Time to Lent. Lent is a season of fasting, almsgiving, and intentional prayer in preparation for Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection. It is a period of about 40 days where we deny ourselves a little bit more so as to imitate how Jesus fasted and prayed for 40 days in the desert. Millions of Catholics like you will be walking around with ashes on their foreheads in the shape of a cross. The ashes are symbolic of our mortality and how we will all become ash one day. Lent is also a time for abstaining from certain pleasures such as meat, our favorite foods, or activities. The purpose is to redirect our focus towards our relationship with God and reminds us that saying no to things that make us feel good builds spiritual strength. Learning to say no to ourselves by replacing our time with the Lord is growing in faith or spending our time with others through service is a form of almsgiving. Discipline with the grace from God is what gives us the will to restrict ourselves. Lent is not meant to be painful but is intended to distinguish the wants of the flesh from the needs of the human spirit. As Jesus told the Samaritan women, 'Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life.' (John 4:13-14) This comparison between earthly water and spiritual water is Jesus attempting to explain the spiritual needs that supersede the flesh. People like the Samaritan women should be inquiring about the salvation that Jesus brings and how only through him can we have eternal life after we turn to ash. Begin your Lenten plans early by meditating on what you can give or give up to Christ this upcoming season. Happy Sunday!

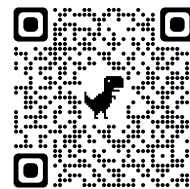
